



Lake St Clair

Nestled in the foothills of the Mount Royal National Park, 25kms from Singleton is picturesque Lake St Clair. It is 16kms long, holds 283 megaliters when full, (almost half of Sydney Harbour). Although there were several boats fishing the same weekend as the Hunter Valley Flyfishing Club, due to the vastness of the water, there was little impact for the shore fishing. The camping facilities were spacious with clean toilets and showers. We arrived to meet two Rods from the HVFFC with a third pitching up later in the weekend. We helped them and Peter set up their trailers and two tents for the upcoming gathering.


Not knowing the water is as exhilarating as the act of fishing itself. I ventured out 30 metres from our van with my trusty 6wt and a black Hares Ear fly. I hooked my first bass on my second cast and was taken by surprise by how hard the 40cm fish fought. The weather was sunny with no wind, quite a perfect start to the trip and the fish were willing. The advice was to fish just on dark which is when I hooked six and landed five in the evening session, between 5pm-8pm. I was told they are on all night, but I had had enough fun.



Next day we woke to a windy, westerly, I estimated about 40klms/hour. Fellow Coffs Harbour member, Ray and his wife Helen arrived with their motorhome. Ray joined me just in time to see me lose a fish in the weed. It was tough with only two landed but catching seemed superfluous in the context of things.



Friday dawned with the wind still blowing so Ray and I went for a walk into the next bay which we hoped was a little sheltered. Ray opened his day with a stonker 45cm+ bass which put its head down in the weeds and with incredible patience he freed and landed it. He followed it up with another and I managed a couple myself which ended up being a great shared experience. Sue spent her time either socialising with the ladies or reading. She also rushed off a couple of little watercolour paintings while the rain and wind persisted. The lure of fishing holds her, not for the catch, but for the places it takes us.





Saturday morning was calmer but we were slow to go and by the time we were ready to leave with Allan having arrived the wind had picked up again. (Sorry Allan.) We fished two separate bays, with Ray the only one to touch a fish using an exotic Salmon fly. By the time we left for home the rain started. I persisted tirelessly on my own from 2pm till 4.30pm with fly changes eliciting no response but the fish are on their own programme. Luckily, on dark at 6pm I landed three. We joined the fishermen and their wives for a barbecue around a massive fire with plenty of fish stories, red wine and some guitar music. The Hunter Club made us feel welcome and handed out tips freely and I am sure they will do the same with the upcoming Salmon Classic at Swansea.



Lake St Clair Bass Fishing Weekend Reflections

During the June fishing weekend with the Hunter Valley Fly Fishing Club at Lake St Clair we were made very welcome by all the members we met. They willingly volunteered tips and generously shared their knowledge with us. I thank them for that and look forward to fishing with them again in the future.

Throughout the weekend, the weather conditions were cold, wet and windy, or perhaps to put it another way just plain challenging. When Helen and I arrived late on Thursday afternoon, Tom and Sue had already been there for a couple of days and I found Tom fishing from the shoreline only metres from his campsite. He soon told me stories of the Bass he had already caught. This had me gearing up and fishing within half an hour of arriving.

Extremely strong winds on Friday made for difficult casting conditions and soon saw us searching for a shoreline that offered some protection. We each landed a couple of nice Bass that made the walking worthwhile.

Allan arrived late Friday evening, so the three of us fished together on Saturday morning, with Allan driving us to other locations around the lake. Thankfully the wind had eased and there were no longer white caps on the water. Just after lunch unfortunately the wind was replaced with quite heavy rainfall, Tom braved the rain and had a successful afternoon, while Allan and I took shelter from the elements.

By Sunday morning the ground was waterlogged and very slippery. Somehow Tom was able to escape from his waterside campsite and drive up the greasy hillside to the safety of solid ground. I'm still not sure how he made it. Despite the dirty weather, I had a very enjoyable weekend and will return there one day.

Some things I learned from the weekend:

- * Wet gloves don't keep your hands warm.
- * When packing, check that the rod tubes have rods in them. (Ray always checks but the same can't be said for the Secretary Editor)
- * Thistles are not a fisherman's friend.
- * Thermal underwear is worth far more than it cost.
- * I need to reduce the number of false casts that I do.
- * Casting practice is a valuable investment.

Bimini (shotgun) start from the Urunga boat ramp closest to the bridge at 7.30 am Finishing @ 12 noon Lunch 12.30 Presentation 1pm

This will be a friendly competition with all fish to be photographed on a brag mat or similar measuring device. Absolutely no fish, alive or deceased, will be eligible. Random prizes will be awarded – not necessarily for the biggest or most fish. The judge's decision will be final - no exceptions. All entries are as individuals - no teams considered.

Cost \$5 per person, this includes 2 flies, sausage sandwiches for lunch, bread for burley.

Boat captains will be teamed with other member based around experience and ability. The goal is for the more experienced member to share knowledge and guide the other to a memorable event.

Catching Mullet on fly is highly addictive and fantastic sight casting fun. It's not unusual for large numbers to be caught with a possible by catch of Bream and other species.

Long leaders / tippet 4lb on the lightest rod you own is the weapon of choice. The club has suitable outfits available to lend - first in best dressed. Contact the secretary to book a club rod.

Nobody will be left on their own to flounder. At the briefing at 7.15am bread for burley will be distributed and information on where to fish will be supplied. Anyone who isn't 100% confident in the process will be looked after and teamed with a member who is.

Salmon at Last!

We are trying to make up for lost time, with 2020 being a write off due to the Covid lockdown and general socialising rules governing the outbreak, interfering with our social activities. This all meant less time on the water and fewer fishing trips with mates. But this year we have been determined to make up for lost time.

A few reconnaissance trips and asking questions of the locals, had us thinking that the salmon season at Swansea was hot to trot. Last week we saw several pods of limited numbers that were fickle and finicky, and spooked outside the range of a decent cast. Another day I had a report of a massive school just inside the heads. Peter decided that we should give it a run on the weekend, hopefully the weekend warriors have not got our intel!

I had to decline a Friday trip due to child minding duties, also a Saturday and a Sunday (sounds like a broken record), meanwhile Peter picked up Fred to help crew the Quinnie and share in the spoils.

They started out on a crisp, clear and still Sunday morning, arriving at an already busy Blacksmiths ramp. With the main parking area full, they left the car and trailer at the overflow park. Soon on the water, they headed to usual haunts before discovering a large school of salmon off Lucy's breakwater around 7am. The school departed the channel towards Moon Island accompanied by a rather large bronze whaler shark, sizing up his breakfast. Peter and Fred fished to the school all the way from Lucy's, south of Moon Island, then between the bombies to around the front of the island. Considering each fish takes around 10 to 15 minutes to land, they did extremely well to land half a dozen fish each by coffee time.

Just under the Swansea Bridge, the Tides café has a new wharf, a long overdue fixture after 2 years of having to tip toe over the oysters and scale the sea wall. There to greet the fellas was the resident dolphin who put on a skilful show of riding the boat's bow wave, before departing to deeper water. Over a coffee they decided to ring me.



I was supervising several grandkids, getting them ready for a bushwalk to Glenrock lagoon, when the call arrived. Fish everywhere, you should be here! As quick as a flash, I handed over the reins of responsibility to my son, and said I'd be back soon. Into the car and off to Swansea, bemoaning the fact that I had no rod, reel, flies, hat or polaroids with me. For someone who normally prides himself on being super organised for a fishing trip, I did have a minor panic attack, but Peter assured me that he had a spare rod and reel in the car and I found a baseball cap in the boot.



Waiting at Blacksmiths wharf, Peter and Fred soon had me kitted out, life jackets secured and we were headed back out through the heads. You never had to look for the fish, just the boats corralling a 2ha school east of Moon Island. Most of the skippers were obliging enough for spin fishermen, but the occasional cowboy thought it was kosher to troll right through the middle of the feeding school ... weekends attract a lot of mugs! Anyway, this was not going to put us off. I fished hard with borrowed gear, missing quite a few strikes before hooking up on a nice fish. 15 minutes later I landed the fish minus the reel handle as its screw stripped and left me hand lining the Salmon to the net. Apparently, the handling exercise was repeated later as Peter was stripping fly line from his other reel to get kinks out. When he got to the backing, a Salmon hit and the backing knot broke. He was left holding the fly line with the fish thrashing on the end of the leader. Fred came to the rescue with a freehand nail knot, meanwhile Peter was handling the big Salmon

like an adapt hand liner. A hectic couple of moments, but all worked out in the end.






Peter got a call from Brad who had coffees and pies waiting at the wharf. I satisfied my need to be connected to a 2021 salmon, so we hurried back to our mate for a snack and shift change. We had a quick chat, before I departed to resume my child minding duties. The boys continued with the action at Moon Island for few more hours before Brad decided that his already crook back wasn't getting any better. I rang him later and he raved about the trip, not a mention of the back, so take a lesson from that, a successful fishing trip is always good medicine!



Now, that leads me to the Salmon Classic invitation to be held on the weekend of 21^{st} and 22^{nd} of August. Get your names in to me, and make your accommodation arrangements before camping places are all taken. 2021 Swansea Salmon Classic Sat 21st and Sun 22nd August


This year's Swansea Salmon Classic will be a low key event, and people will have to organise their own accommodation and meals, with the exception of Saturday night, when we can have a bistro meal and catchup at the Swansea Workers Club if you choose. I will give as much detail as possible for you to make informed decisions on what suits you most. The cost to attend will be \$zero, but you will have to buy your own meals from the bistro (around \$20 last year).



Fishing

That's what we're here for. The salmon usually work between Swansea bridge and Green or Moon Island (depending on your map), at various times of the tide. Bring a boat or a buddy with a boat and abide by all normal water navigation rules. If you have a spare seat, you will make somebody's day. Put it out there on email. Protocol dictates that you must not drive through the middle of a salmon school. Have respect for your fellow fishermen and don't spook the fish. One other thing, I encourage all to share information on flies, (give a few excess ones away), tackle and locations as we all like to catch fish. This is particularly for the benefit of those members who have not fished here before. The 2 main boat launching ramps are at Blacksmiths, over the road from the Holiday Park, and at Swansea, outside the Lakeside Park. Both are easily accessible.

Gear:- 8 or 9 wt rods with intermediate lines and 20lb tippet, just in case a few big green backs come in. Many flies work, and the fish will be feeding on small anchovies, white bait and eyes. Bring a range of Surf Candies to 75mm, smaller polar fibre flies or miniature Candies.



Accommodation

I have spoken to both caravan parks and they have plenty of accommodation both camping and cabins at the moment, but you will need to book soon. Let them know that you are with the Hunter Valley Fly Fishing Club and they will try and group you together in the park.

You take care of your own booking, whether camp or cabin.

Doing It in the Dark

I don't like fly fishing at night. I have enough problems during the daytime without the added complication of having to do it in the dark. But if you want to catch fish sometimes you have to do it at night. Fish such as Bass and Trout don't like bright sunshine so if you want to catch them you have to fish when they are most active.

I'm not going to write about how to catch fish at night. You would be better off asking some of the more experienced night time fly fishers. These days I prefer sight fishing and I don't go out after dark. That's not to say I don't fish the early morning and late evening, but once the sun sets I'm usually thinking of going home.



Casting a fly during the day or night is fundamentally the same. If you can cast a fly well enough to catch a fish in the daylight you can do the same at night. There are, however, a few things you should consider if you want to do it in the dark. Without going into the detail of how to fish in the dark, this month I want to talk about how to cast in the dark.

First, I must touch on some obvious equipment issues you need to consider. During the day most people fish wearing sunglasses. When the sun goes down, the sunglasses come off. You should never cast without eye protection especially at night. A pair of clear plastic safety glasses will do the job if you have not reached the stage in life where you have to wear glasses all the time. When I am not wearing my prescription glasses I use a pair of cheap yellow sunglasses at dawn and dusk.

It goes without saying that you are going to need a torch. As tempting as it might be to use the torch to watch your loops ... don't. Fish feed at night because it is dark so a flashing light is going to spook any fish in the vicinity. A good head torch is essential at night but get one with a red light for those occasions you forget to face away from the water when you switch it on. A torch is also essential for tying on flies ... along with the magnifying glasses I now carry. And as for tying on flies, I always make sure I have the fly I intend to use tied on well before I venture out at dusk or dawn. Sometime it's a bit of a gamble knowing which fly to tie on but it is a bigger gamble for someone like me trying to tie a fly on in the dark.

You might not consider line management as casting but you will never be able to fly fish if you don't learn how to handle the fly line. Wading a river, walking a lake shore, standing on the bow of a flats skiff or walking a beach all require you to do something about the line you have stripped from your reel to cast. Doing it in the dark brings added complications. The use of a stripping basket or clipper stripper can make life much easier. If you are stationary you can get away with dropping the line at your feet and making repeated casts but if you want to be mobile you need a line management device. Once you get used to using a stripping basket regularly it becomes automatic and it doesn't matter whether it is day or night.





Watching your loops when casting is important. At night this becomes much more difficult and you have to rely on your other senses to know if your loops are good. The ability to feel the rod load and hear the movement of the rod and line comes with time spent casting. You can practice during the day by covering your eyes and learning to judge

distance and direction by feel and sound. Listening for the fly landing on the water will also give you a good idea of how well you formed those loops. If you are using a double fly rig you should listen for the sound of the two flies hitting the water one after another. You need to be able to feel the line pull tight in your hand as the fly nears the water. If there is slack and the fly lands in a heap your casting is not as good as it could be and you will probably end up with a tangle. It's too late to practice the night you go fishing, so make a point of doing something about it the next time you practice.

Still on the subject of loops, it's not a good idea to try for those narrow loops that you strive for when going for distance. At night you could be fishing with large flies and you want to avoid hitting your rod or throwing tailing loops. Make your loops wider and smoother and you will spend more time fishing and less time untangling. There is often less wind at night so the need for narrow loops and high line speed is reduced. You don't need to cast those long distances you do during the day as the fish move close to shore under the cover of darkness. Slow down and relax. Concentrate more on being smooth and throwing slightly wider loops. Using a slower action rod can help. The ability to vary the size of your loops is something you should practice – before you go fishing at night.

It can be a good idea to put markers on your fly line to aid with casting and retrieving in the dark. It's not much use using a texta colour but you can tie a piece of wool or place a drop of UV resin on the line in strategic places. Many fly lines these days have tactile reminders so that you can tell when the head is out of the tip or when it is time to lift and recast. Being able to tell how much line you have out when you can't see it will avoid hitting those trees behind (you did look before you started didn't you?) and help with accuracy when you are casting at the sound made by a fish.

Casting is about timing, technique and rhythm and nowhere is this more important than when casting in the dark. If you can't see or hear your quarry you need to cover as much water as possible and the temptation is to strive for as much distance as you can. The more water you cover the more chance you have of finding a fish. Unfortunately, when you push your casting to the limit you forget about the smooth application of power and shock the rod. One of the main causes of wind knots is not the wind but the overpowering of the rod. Combine this with too short a casting stroke because you can't watch your back cast unfold and you will inevitably end up with a tailing loop. And who wants to be untangling lines and leaders in the dark!

Fishing at night can be more productive than fishing during the day but you still have to be able to cast. Casting in the dark can be more difficult and needs to be practiced before you go. Time spent preparing, practicing, and learning to manage your line will pay dividends when you do it in the dark.


