Meeting Venue

At our last monthly meeting it was decided that we will have one more meeting at the North Beach Bowling Club before making a final decision. The Games room was certainly a good space for our needs but the addition of televisions showing racing and the moving of the billiard table have made things a bit more difficult. We are going to try and configure the Games Room to see if we can make it work.

If the general consensus is that it's still not working, the decision of where to go will fall back on the Committee. The Committee has already met to discuss the results of the survey and will make its decision if we decide we have to move.



Committee Decisions

The Committee held an extra meeting in June to discuss the results of the survey about the venue for meetings and to minute some of the changes that have been suggested. A summary of the important decisions follows:

- ◆ Meetings will start at 6.00pm from now on, the same time as fly tying.
- ◆ The date for the Gathering@Gumma has changed to 7th 10th September and will be combined with the Bass Day which was to be held on 9th Sept.
- ◆ The date for the Battle of the Bread Fly has been changed to September 2nd.
- ◆ The July 22nd outing will be held at Mylestom.
- ◆ Final payments for Dunmore to be made by the July meeting (\$270 total)
- ◆ The house will be booked again for the Grafton Bass Weekend (20th to 22nd October). The cost will be: \$106 each for 6 people for weekend \$115 each for 5 people for weekend \$130 each for 4 people for weekend
- ◆ The prize for the next major raffle will be a saltwater fly box and flies.

- ◆ Members who enter flies in the fly tying competition, will be able to buy 1 get 1 free in the raffle.
- ◆ A notice of motion has been put forward for the AGM that membership fees remain as they are.

The meeting venue survey results were discussed. Anyone who would like to see the responses is welcome to do so. A summary of the results follows:

- There was little interest in holding meetings in Nambucca or Woolgoolga.
- Coffs and Mylestom were the most popular areas for a meeting venue.
- North Beach Bowling Club and Mylestom Hall were the most popular meeting venues.

Not only do you have to master the complex art of fly casting, you have to hook, play and land a fish on a long, thin rod with fine tippet. When you do land a fish, the achievement should be recognized.

Swansea Salmon Classic

Fri 18th to Sun 20th August

This year's 2023 Swansea Salmon Classic will be held in similar fashion of years past. Please read through the details below as some are new. It will begin Saturday and go through to Sunday. People will have to organise their own accommodation, meals and drinks, however, on Saturday night at 6pm the club will have a bbq, salads, tea, coffee and water. There are some fantastic places to grab takeaway breaky and lunch in Swansea, as well as great coffee. Or, pack some easy sandwich making supplies in the esky and do it on the water like I will be doing.

There are already reports of salmon in the channel so there is no doubt there will be fish around.

If you are a HVFFC club member and want to join in all the festivities – this will cost you \$Zero Dollars. Otherwise, it's a small \$20.00 fee for the weekend for non-members. This includes your Saturday night feast.




Fishing

That's what we're here for. The salmon usually work between Swansea bridge and Green or Moon Island (depending on your map), at various times of the tide. Bring a boat or a buddy with a boat and abide by all normal water navigation rules. If you have a spare seat, you will make somebody's day. Put it out there on email. Protocol dictates that you must not drive through the middle of a salmon school. Have respect for your fellow fishermen and don't spook the fish. One other thing, I encourage all to share information on flies and give a few excess ones away, tackle and locations as we all like to catch fish. This is particularly for the benefit of those members who have not fished here before. There is no competition, this is a chance to share knowledge and strengthen our fantastic community of fishermen.

The 2 main boat launching ramps are at Blacksmiths, over the road from the Holiday Park, and at Swansea, outside the Lakeside Park. Both are easily accessible. Be aware of what you and your boat can do, especially if you decide to cross the bar. Just one bit of advice, if you arrive early on the water your chances of getting fish multiplies!

Gear:- 8 or 9 wt rod with intermediate line and 15- 20lb tippet, just in case a few big green backs come in. Many flies work, and the fish will be feeding on small anchovies, white bait and our flies hopefully. Bring a range of Surf Candies to 75mm, smaller polar fibre flies or miniature Candies. Small Poppers can be exciting too if they are really fired up.

There are a lot of other species in the area - blackfish, bream, whiting, flatties, snapper and kings. Don't feel obliged to target salmon all day! The salmon are the main draw card though, as they make exceptional sport fishing on light tackle. However, the lake and inshore reefs hold lots of other opportunities too.



Accommodation

I have spoken to both caravan parks and they have plenty of accommodation both camping and cabins at the moment, **but you will need to book soon**. Let them know that you are with the Hunter Valley Fly Fishing Club and they will try and group you together in the park.

You take care of your own booking, whether camp or cabin. Blacksmiths Beachside offer great accommodation options if the SLHP is exhausted. Book early - you can always cancel.


Dinner - 6:00pm. Swansea Lake Holiday Park Function Room.

Battle of the Bread Fly 2023

Formerly known as The Mullet Mash, the inaugural **Battle of the Bread Fly** will be held on our home waters on the Bellinger River at Mylestom on:

Saturday September 2nd



Start from the Mylestom boat ramp at 7.30 am. Finishing at 12 noon. Lunch 12.30pm. Presentation 1pm.

This will be a fun competition with anglers only able to use bread flies. All fish caught to be photographed on a brag mat or similar measuring device. Absolutely no fish, dead or alive, will be eligible. There are no prizes except for the glory of being crowned champion. The champion will be the person with the most points verified by photos on a brag board.

Point Score: 5 points for first fish in each different species

1 point for each additional fish of the same species

Cost \$10 per person. This includes: 4 bread flies, sausage sandwiches for lunch, bread for burley.

Members are asked to team up in boats to take advantage of being able to fish anywhere in the Bellinger/Kalang Rivers. If you don't have a boat or kayak and can't find a ride let us know and we will ferry you to various land-based spots. Inexperienced fly fishers will be helped by members sharing their knowledge and skills.

There will be a briefing at 7.15am at the boat ramp at Mylestom where bread for burley will be distributed and information on where to fish will be supplied.

The Big 'un

A few years back, Tom and I took a break from the days spent fishing Eucumbene and explored the Murrumbidgee by taking a rough track down to the river above Tantangara Dam. Upon reaching the water we split up, Tom electing to walk downstream and fish up.



I sat down just above a bit of sandy beach and munched an apple. John Sautelle used to say that you should not stumble straight into a stream, but sit down for five minutes to see what was going on. There was a circular eddy at the edge of the sand with a bit of scum going round and round. Suddenly there was a loud gloop, leaving a bubble the size of a golf ball. That was a big fish I thought.

I can still see it, poised above the stream, it's tail as broad as my hand, every spot on its flanks etched into my memory, before it crashed back in the water and dived deep.

The Murrumbidgee took a right-angled bend above the run, pushed by a strata of rock which showed above the grassy hill and crossed the line of the stream. What a Difference a Fly Line Makes

An activity that we do often in our weekly casting group is a rod testing session. This consists of having everyone place their rod in a circle so that each person has a chance to cast each rod in turn. I sometimes throw in a few of my rods to make things interesting. My rods range from very cheap to expensive and include 4 or 5 identical rods. The identical rods are matched with different line and leader setups. To avoid preconceived ideas about rod brands, I mask the information about the rod with tape. This is probably not necessary in the case of most newcomers who have yet to lean that "sage" is not just an herb they grow in their garden.

Working in pairs, the group then spends about 5 minutes "testing" each rod with short casts, long casts and roll casts. Then they have to write up their findings on the sheet provided:

Rod: State Brand name written on blank (if visible)

Weight: What weight line is the rod rated for? e.g., 5 weight (guess if it is covered up)

<u>Comments about Line:</u> Does the line work with this rod, how does it feel, what taper does the line have? <u>Comments about the Rod and Line</u>: Some rods are identical but have been setup with different lines. Pay particular attention to the way the rod responds to the line and comment on the way the rod and line work together.

Comments about Rod and Line:		

The handful of people who read these articles are probably part of this casting group and know about this already. Those who haven't been involved will be wondering where all this is leading. The reason I am writing about this comes from the discussion and questions that this activity generates. The "testing" leads to conversations about fly rods and fly lines and what a difference a fly line can make.

Of the many things discovered and talked about during these casting sessions, the biggest eye opener for most people is how fly rods perform with different fly lines. When you only own one or two outfits that have been put together by someone in a fly shop, you are not always aware that there are other options. It is only as you try a variety of rod and line combinations that you can see and feel the difference. This is where a casting group with a range of rods and lines to try is invaluable. It also helps to have a casting instructor who has too many rods and lines.


As an aside, I wrote an article about fly lines back in 2015. Back then, I did a Google search and counted over 60 different fly lines on the market, and that does not include all the no-name brands from China. Although there are so many brands on the market there are only a handful of manufacturers who make these lines. I could only find 6 major manufacturers of fly lines in the world (again, excluding China). If you do the maths, you can see that many different brands come out of the same factory. I think if I were to count fly lines and manufacturers today the figures wouldn't be much different. You can see an updated list at the end of the article.

The difference a fly line makes really became obvious when comparing identical rods set up with different lines. Five 4 weight rods were assembled with various lines and leaders. The rods were definitely at the cheaper end of the market but when they were matched with the right line, they performed very well and scored quite highly in the opinion of the casters. When the rods and lines didn't work together, the results were equally obvious.

Comments about how the rods and lines worked together left people asking lots of questions about fly lines. When you have spent as much money as I have on fly lines, you take it for granted that everyone knows all there is to know about fly lines. That wasn't the case within our group and it may not be the case with you. So, for those who are beginning their fly fishing journey, I need to go back and explain a few things about fly lines. If you already know these things you can skip this section (you probably haven't bothered to read this far anyway!)

As I mentioned earlier, I have written about fly lines on a number occasions in this column but I am still only scratching the surface on the subject. If you want the whole picture there's Google and plenty of books, videos and magazine articles by more knowledgeable people than me. One of the most authoritative figures in the design of fly lines is Bruce Richards of Scientific Anglers. He is considered by many to be one of the top fly casters and instructors in the world and what he doesn't know about fly lines is not worth knowing. His book, "Modern *Fly Lines*", published in 1994, is still regarding as the 'bible' on fly lines and sells for over \$200 when one can be found.

I don't have a copy of Bruce's book (does anyone have a copy to sell?) but if you were to read the book you would learn a lot about fly lines that will help you understand the difference a fly line can make. The following information is not from Bruce's book but I am sure it's pretty close to what he has written. Understanding this background information on fly line terminology and taper is essential if you are going to be get the most out of your fly rod and line.



Line tip: the front part of the line, equally thin over its length, where the leaders is attached. The tip was level so that when cutting off leaders with nail knots you didn't lose any of the taper of the fly line. These days the tip is often omitted and replaced with a welded loop.

Front Taper: The front taper is the section of the fly line that transitions from the thick belly to the fine tip. It helps control the energy transfer during casting, allows for delicate presentations, and provides smooth turnover of the leader and fly.

Belly: The belly is the thickest and heaviest part of the fly line. It carries most of the line's weight, providing the momentum required for casting larger flies or longer distances. The length and taper of the belly vary depending on the specific fly line design and purpose.

Rear Taper: The rear taper is the section of the fly line that transitions from the thick belly to the thinner running line. It helps control the transfer of energy during the casting stroke and ensures a smooth turnover from the belly to the running line.

Running Line: The running line is the thinner and more level section of the fly line that extends from the rear taper to the end of the line. It is designed to shoot through the guides smoothly during casting, allowing for longer distance casts.

Welded Loops: Many modern fly lines come with pre-welded loops at both ends. These loops provide convenient attachment points for leaders, tippets, or backing, eliminating the need for knots.

Now that you have a handle on the terminology of fly lines you need to know about their taper. The taper of a fly line refers to how the weight and diameter of the line are distributed along its length. In the days of horse hair and silk, fly lines were usually level as it was difficult to make complex tapers by weaving the natural materials together. Once plastics came into the equation, level lines lost their popularity as complex taper were able to be made when extruding the coating. Level lines are almost impossible to find today except as running lines for shooting heads.



The are five common tapers that you will find available today. Each one is different. The taper affects how the line loads the rod, how it shoots through the guides, and how it delivers the fly to the target. Selecting an appropriate taper can make a world of difference to how a rod casts and fishes. Our casting group quickly discovered what a difference a taper can make.

Here are the five common tapers but within each category there are many variations as can be seen by the variety of fly lines produced by many fly line companies.

Weight Forward (WF): This is the most popular taper for fly lines. The weight is concentrated in the front section of the line, making it easier to cast long distances and control larger flies. The front taper, belly, and rear taper are all designed to facilitate smooth casting and accuracy.

WEIGHT FORWARD LINE

Double Taper (DT): In a double taper line, both ends of the line taper gradually towards the middle. This allows for delicate presentations and better control at shorter distances. DT lines can be reversed when one end gets worn out, effectively doubling the lifespan of the line.




Shooting Head Taper: These lines have an aggressive front taper and a thin running line. They are designed for long-distance casting, particularly for saltwater or big game fishing. Shooting tapers enable anglers to shoot out more line with less effort.



Triangle Taper: Triangle taper lines have a long, gradual front taper that forms a triangle shape. This design allows for delicate presentations, accurate casting, and gentle turnover. They are favoured by anglers who require precise control and want to achieve delicate presentations.



Spey Lines: Spey lines are specifically designed for two-handed casting techniques, primarily used in Spey and switch rod fishing. They come in various tapers, such as long belly, mid belly, and short belly, to accommodate different casting styles and fishing conditions. Scandinavian and Skagit lines are variations of the spey line.



When it came to testing different tapered lines on the same rods in our casting group, it became obvious what a difference a fly line can make. Some tapers worked well while others presented problems or did not do the job as was expected. But there's a lot more to understand about fly lines than just taper. The way we weigh a line to find which rods it is designed for, the core, coating, texture and even the material that it is made from are all important factors to consider. Next month, I'll discuss these and other things about fly lines in the never-ending discovery of what a difference a fly line makes.

Fly Tying

The theme for this month's fly tying competition is a choice of an Australian salmon fly or a bread fly. With the 'Battle of the Bread Fly' and 'Swansea Salmon Classic' coming up, fly boxes will need to be topped up with your favourite ties for these outings.



Bread flies have featured in the newsletter before, so for something different, this month's step-by-step will feature a fly for Australian Salmon. Most people will opt for a surf candy which has been very successful on salmon (and other species) before. The problem is with surf candies you need UV resin and a UV torch which not everyone has.

I came across this fly second hand from Jim Wray who stole it from Peter Blom from the South East Queensland Fly Fishing Club. Peter just calls it "the fly" because he uses it almost exclusively. I think we should call it "Blommy's Baitfish." Peter has been using this pattern for many years for salmon, tuna, trevally, bream,

queenfish and a host of other species. He was probably using it for bass when we met up with him and fellow SEQ club members at Toonumbar Dam a few years ago. It's a versatile fly that is quick and easy to tie and it works. I haven't caught salmon or trevally on it yet but it has worked in the Bellingen on the local bream.

The beauty of this fly is it needs few materials and can be tied on regular saltwater or jig hooks. Peter uses jig hooks for all his ties. The advantage of the jig hook is the fly swims hook point up, avoiding snagging the bottom and the angled eye gives the fly a very undulating movement when stripped.





This is the fly we will be tying at this month's fly tying night. We will be tying it on both a regular and a jig head hook. The instructions that follow, show the fly being tied on both styles of hook. Although the pattern is copied from Peter's fly, I have changed a few things to match the materials I had on hand and my lazy tying habits.

Materials

Thread: You can use any thread you like. I used some pink (I think it's pink flat 3/0). Peter likes to coat the hook shank with head cement (clear nail polish) before using clear mono thread and running it down the shank to give the fly greater durability. He finishes the head with pink UV thread

Hooks: Size #4 O'Shaughnessy Saltwater Hook or size #4 jig hook in your favourite brand. (Peter uses Gamakatsu 11409 Jig Hooks Size #2.)





Eyes: Bead chain small or large depending on size and weight. You could also use brass dumbbell eyes





Body: White sparkle chenille such as Estaz Petite



Wing: White Unique Hair, Streamer Hair, Slinky Fibre or similar.

Tail: I used blue Krystal Flash but Peter prefers UV Pearl.





Place hook in vice and introduce thread.





Tie in bead chain (or dumbbell) eyes.





Tie in a few pieces of blue Krystal Flash for the tail.



Introduce the white chenille and wrap thread forward to the front of the eyes.



Wrap chenille forward and tie off in front of eyes. Trim excess.



Turn fly over and tie in a slip of white synthetic hair about twice the body length.



Build up the head and tie off. Secure with head cement.



The finished fly is ready to fish.



hook shank to make fly last longer when catching fish with teeth. I also use 1kg mono to build the fly and Loctite super glue as head cement. I use an intermediate line and fluorocarbon tapered leader. For deep fish eg trevally, flathead or bream I use short (100mm) slow strips but if bream are hitting shrimp on the surface same short strips but a bit faster - if tailor, trevally or queenies are about long fast strips do the job.





Fish this fly like you would any streamer, clouser or surf candy. Use with a floating line for surface feeding fish or add weight by wrapping lead around the shank before covering with chenille. Lead dumbbell eyes can also be used for extra weight. Use a sink tip line for getting down to where bream and flathead live.

The following information comes from Peter who is happy to share his pattern with anyone who wants to use it.

I use the jig hook as it doesn't seem to get bitten off as often as straight shank hooks when you encounter toothy critters. While the materials used in the pictures are similar to the ones I used to use, I have changed to some that reflect a bit of UV (but not too much). Please see photo for most of the materials used - I use clear nail polish as a base for the materials to fix to



Not only is Peter a champion fly tyer, he can catch fish on his flies, too.


